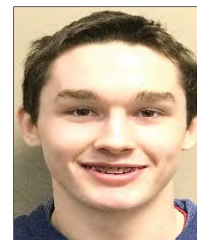

THINGS ABOUT TODAY'S GAME

Today's game will follow the rules, regulations and format of the Washington Interscholastic Activities Association. However, we have made a few changes for player participation and fan enjoyment:

LENGTH OF GAME: Four 10-minute quarters. This is to allow more playing time for our expanded roster size.

BREAKS/TIMEOUTS: A two-minute media timeout will be taken at the first dead ball after the five minute mark of each quarter. Coaches have the standard five timeouts for use throughout the game as well. There is at least a 15 minute break between the boys and girls game.

HALFTIME: Length is 10-minutes. Each halftime begins with a performance by the Kamiakin dance team, followed by profile interviews with players and coaches on SWX.

PARTICIPATION: The coaches make every effort to ensure equal playing time among all the athletes involved. The starting five for each side were selected at random prior to tipoff. Substitutions are made regularly, typically every five minutes in groups of five.

SHOT CLOCK: A standard 30-second clock for the girls and a 35-second clock for the boys will be used. (But trust us, it will never come close to running out).

STATISTICS: Following the game, official statistics will be posted at parkerhodge.com.

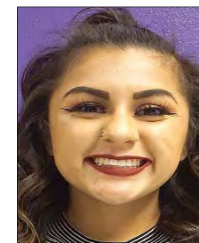

Tri-Cities leads series 18-8

HOW IT ALL STARTED

A new chapter for the storied All-Star game

The YMCA of the Greater Tri-Cities and the staff at SWX are excited to bring the high school All-Star Classic back to the Tri-Cities after a two-year absence.

Today's game marks the 23rd installment of the series between Yakima's best hoopsters and those from the Tri-Cities. Its history, however, began long before any of today's players were born.

The game was originally called the Newspaper Classic and was conceived in 1994 by the sports departments of the Yakima Herald-Republic and the Tri-City Herald. It was considered the grand finale to the long high school season and featured one boys game and one girls game with 10 players on each roster.

In 2000, the name was changed to the Media Classic and the series was expanded to give more athletes a chance to play. All-stars from the Class 4A and 3A schools would have their own game. So would the all-stars from the 2A, 1A and B schools. While it allowed more participation from the players, it also became more fun for the fans as they could watch the players from all classifications play together on the same court, often for the first time.

In 2004, the format returned to one boys game and one girls game with all classifications playing together. The

rosters were expanded to 15 players and the quarters were extended to 10 minutes to allow maximum participation.

The games continued until 2016 when the newspapers changed their focus and no longer had the resources to plan the games.

After a two-year absence, Jeff Morrow, the Tri-City Herald's retired sports editor and Parker Hodge, a former Herald employee who together had planned the games for over a decade, decided to revive the game and partnered with the staff of SWX who agreed to televise the games.

The response for the revival of these games has been terrific from not only the players who are selected, but also from the community, who today will get the rare chance to see some of the most talented players from the Mid-Columbia and Yakima Valley together on one floor.

Organizers also wanted to continue the tradition of the games, which donated the proceeds of the games to charity since the beginning. In fact, the games have donated over \$25,000 to local charities over the years.

This year, we have selected the YMCA of the Greater Tri-Cities and the Kamiakin High School dance team as the recipients of the funds raised at today's game.
